September's mission project and offering of \$614 benefitted Project Independence. On September 7th, fourteen Cornerstone volunteers met at TeWinkle Park in Costa Mesa to assist with the annual Project Independence Walk and to cheer on participants. Project Independence provides support for those living with various disabilities, ranging from autism, cerebral palsy, vision, speech or hearing impairment. The clients face many obstacles related to limited income, accessibility, and mobility. Project Independence helps them in many ways by coaching them with life skills, transporting them to doctors and jobs, and also provides various services to help them accomplish and gain some independence.

In October, we collected \$466 for our mission offering, which will be sent to the United Methodist Committee on Relief's (UMCOR) International Disaster Response efforts in the Bahamas after Hurricane Dorian. Funds have already been given by UMCOR that provide immediate, emergency short-term funding to address the basic human needs of those affected by this catastrophic storm. Our mission funds will continue the current work being done to support post-Dorian relief and recovery work. †

The evening of October 19, 2019, the Ministries of three Japanese American Bishops (Bishop Robert Hoshibata, Bishop Roy Sano, and Bishop Grant Hagiya) serving the United Methodist Church were celebrated in an epic event. Dear Beloved Church,

On October 26th, we completed the Trunk or Treat event led by Stacey & Benny Wong, Gary & Sheree Low, and many volunteers from our church, friends, and community. What an amazing and fun event! It was my second experience of the gifts and talents at work in our congregation through a community event, and another reminder of how wonderfully blessed we are by God to be able to share love in the world. I am inspired by the hard work and dedication of all in our community who make these events possible.

There were so many smiling families who visited our fun, decorated trunks – the games played were so creative and interactive, and the food was delicious! Every person I spoke with that evening was filled with joy, and I pray those families without a church home may visit us and become united in our love for God and neighbor. As the new pastor to our church, hospitality and welcoming neighbors will be a central focus of my mission. We all have the ability to impact lives for God and a simple invitation of welcome to any church gathering could make a life-changing difference.

During our event, I also learned a lot about our local police's K-9 unit – how the 'dog officer' only responds to his police trainer/handler and not even to other police officers. The police dog searches specifically for narcotics and chases down assailants for apprehending, while other trained dogs can detect explosives. It was

beneficial to learn from our local police department and also interview with them to advertise our annual event. The officers had a great time and also enjoyed some candy too! I am also thankful for our local fire department showing off their huge fire truck with all the bells and whistles. These men and women truly are real-life heroes putting their lives on the line to protect and serve us!

The month of October was truly special. I am grateful for planning and attending two special events this month, our church's Trunk or Treat Halloween and the convocation to celebrate three of our Japanese American United Methodist Bishops: Rev. Roy I. Sano, Rev. Robert Hoshibata, and Rev. Grant Hagiya. This past year, I served as the vice chair of the National Japanese American United Methodist Caucus and worked with our board members to plan a four-day event from October 17 – 21 for our National Japanese American United Methodist Clergy Retreat and Convocation. This event took place at West Los Angeles United Methodist Church, Faith United Methodist Church, and the Ken Miller Recreation Center. In all of these activities, I am reminded of 1 Corinthians 10:31 (NRSV), "So, whatever you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do everything for the glory of God." In all things, may God be glorified. Amen.

When my husband was seriously ill and lying in the bed of the nursing home, I went to the common kitchen area for a cup of water. There, I saw two ladies talking. The older of the two ladies appeared to be very exhausted and was talking about her long-suffering pain. The other lady was nodding her head and listening quietly. By the time I was leaving the area, I distinctly overheard the older lady expressing loudly about her desire to give up her life and wishing to shorten her life by all means, "What is the point to live, huh?" I thought she was just joking or expressing her frustration, and I left the room. I could not believe that she would dare treat her only life like a person throwing out their personal items, especially when I thought about my husband struggling desperately for survival in his critical situation.

However, several months ago, at the age of 81, I had fractured my backbone. About a month later, I fell in my backyard, which added more pain to my original problem. Ever since then, I have been experiencing severe pain every morning. The pain is unbearable; it is like being stabbed by a sharp knife. It is sad to say, but the pain never goes away. Therefore, painful mornings became a part of my daily life. Sadder still, I found myself not being able to move around as freely as I wanted. Everything even within my reach seemed to have an "impossible" tag on it, and I felt the doors were closing up on me. Facing these miserable situations, I came to realize that the older lady whom I saw at the nursing home was not joking after all. I believe she truly meant it when she said she did not want to live in that painful situation. I perfectly understand that deep down in her heart, she was feeling so miserable that she desired to shorten her life. I do not blame her now, as I am in the same boat and experiencing that agony. Truly, who would like to, and who can endure to, live in that painful condition?

More than a decade ago, I faced a life-threatening brain cancer and needed surgery. I begged to God, as King Hezekiah did in the Old Testament, not to take my life away but to live another 15 to 20 years. Thanks to God's mercy, my request was granted. Now at this time, coping with this difficult painful condition and heavily depending on all of my children, do I want to ask God to extend my life just as I had previously? I paused and hesitated a while. Then, I prayed to God, "Merciful God, if I am allowed to live without infirmity resulting in no burden to others, I would be very happy to serve. Otherwise, I would be a mere 'vegetable' and be meaningless." Before long, I realized I was in a dilemma. If I gave up the fight in getting better, my guilty conscience would be pounding on me because all of my children were sincerely working very hard to take care of me daily to aid in my recovery. Besides, I could not forget all of my relatives' and friends' constant concerns and encouragements. With all these blessings, how could I disappoint my children and others just because I wanted an easy way out? Now, my physical struggle became my mental struggle. Shakespeare once said, "To be or not to be, that is the question." How real that is to me!

It is true that God never sleeps nor slumbers. Promptly, God showed me the answer in the CUMC Sunday service program. I do not usually pay attention to the title of the sermon. However, on this particular day, I noticed the title of the sermon indicated uniquely as "...It is not what you want to..." - YES, the answer is telling me exactly that I do not decide what I want for life. He is God. He is the One who makes things happen, so the choice is not mine. Just as it had happened in my previous writings, I still failed to learn. Here again, He reminded me that He has a plan for everyone including me. Truly, He holds my tomorrows. I bow down to give thanks to God for waking me up before making any mistakes. What a blessing to have God as my guide and protector. I hope that the older lady at the nursing home would find blessings as well.

Afterwards, days quickly passed, and I did not see any significant change in my condition. I became impatient. I wanted an assurance, so I asked God, "Gracious God, is the blessing of healing on the way soon?!?" A few days later, the words "Be patient" caught my attention when I opened the Bible. As I did not want those two words to be my answer from God, I tried to ignore it. Therefore, I did not even remember which chapter or which book I found the words. The following day, my son called and checked on my condition. Ironically, he said to me, "A bone fracture needs a long time to heal, especially at an older age. So be patient...patient, Mom!" Wow! I was astounded to hear the same words, "Be patient" from my son. It really confirmed that the words in the Bible were God's answer, which I tried to ignore. Evidently God is instructing me to learn to wait patiently, no matter what condition I am in. Then I thought to myself, "I still have to continue to endure this pain? How awful and sad!" Suddenly, Apostle Paul came to my mind. He had endured so much hardship. When he asked God's mercy to remove his thorn (suffering) on three occasions, God answered, "My grace is sufficient for you." Knowing this, how can I ask any more from God? In fact, Apostle Paul's endurance made me humble. No doubt he deserves the crown of victory at the end of his course as he fought the good fight of faith. What a great example Apostle Paul has shown. Just as people are in the waiting room waiting for a newborn baby, I am in the waiting room with the thought of Apostle Paul, patiently waiting for the blessing of recovery. After all these happenings, I came to be aware that God is really watching every step of my life. Now, although I am still waiting in the waiting room, I feel very blessed to know He is my lamp upon my feet and a light upon my path.

On October 11, 2019, several New Lifers enjoyed the walking tour of Locke, which is the only rural Chinese town left in the United States. We toured the boarding house, Joe Shoong School, Memorial Park, Gambling Hall and Chinese Garden. It was established in 1915 and inhabited almost exclusively by Chinese until recent years. In 1970, the town was placed on the Registry of National Historic Places. Locke still looks almost as it did 60 years ago. For more information, visit www. lockeca.com.

On October 12-13, with the collaboration of various organizations (The 1882 Foundation, Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management, and The Chinese Historical Society of

America), we had an educational and fascinating tour of the history of *Rediscovering the Path of the Chinese Railroad Workers*. We were fortunate to have seven representatives from various organizations, including the two tour docents, educate us about the history of the various sites of the Chinese railroad workers. The first day, we toured Bloomer Cut, Secret Town, Summit Tunnel, and China Wall by bus. The next day, we traveled leisurely by train through beautiful Tahoe National Forest and several small towns. Our trip ended at the amazing *California State Railroad Museum* in Sacramento. We encourage you to take this tour to educate your children, family, and friends on the rich history of our ancestors. The tour occurs only once a year. This was the 3rd tour of the historical and fascinating history of the thousands of Chinese immigrants who completed the first railroad 150 years ago, who are finally receiving recognition and honor for their amazing achievement. 
