### **Missions**

In preparation for Easter, the Missions Committee planned to create 50 Easter baskets for the Friendly Center's Easter Basket distribution program. We were ready to collect Easter basket supplies, and our Cornerstone congregation would meet at the end of March for basket assembly. The committee purchased many supplies early on, such as multi-colored baskets, Easter grass, coloring books/crayons, chocolate bunnies, jelly beans, paddle balls, stuffed animals, and toothbrushes/toothpaste. Then, the quarantine/stay-at-home orders were put in place by the State of California, and non-essential businesses were closed. The Friendly Center's Easter Basket program for lowincome families was cancelled due to the coronavirus outbreak. However, since enough basket supplies were already on hand, a Missions Committee member assembled 43 baskets and gave them away to HIS House and other community members as a message of hope and encouragement during the pandemic. As for the mission offering for March, we collected a total of \$540, which was sent to UMCOR to assist the disaster response and recovery after tornadoes devastated central Tennessee.

The April mission offering supported a joint missions project with Placentia UMC. At the start of the year, we decided to partner with our sister congregation to help furnish the 50 apartments at the Placentia Veterans Village that is currently under construction. PUMC's missions committee served as the point of contact with the City of Placentia. It was later decided that our two congregations would collaborate to provide a "scrub bucket" for each apartment at the Placentia Veterans Village, which is scheduled to open in early June. Each bucket would contain sponges, kitchen and bath cleaner, dish soap, pot scrubbers, reusable wipes, dish towels, and a small dust pan and broom. Just the supplies needed to tidy a new apartment and make it feel like a home! The supplies for this project will be purchased in May, and the buckets will likely be assembled with social distancing practices and personal protective gear. †

# **Reflections of Blessings During Crisis**

Living through this pandemic, our church community feels stronger than ever. We continue to meet and pray together with our small groups virtually through Zoom, Facebook, or Discord. Volunteers shop and run errands for our sheltering members. We celebrate Sunday services, communion, birthdays, and are blessed with music led by our praise song leaders, especially Cheryl C. and Amy. Jon and Cheryl helped us go "live" with "Worship Online" Sunday services, and their expertise has been a lifesaver. Pastor John's sermons are so grounding and reassuring. They provide a calm, spiritual focus when we may feel scattered or when the news of the world sounds too distressing.

This morning (May 3), Pastor John highlighted Romans 12:9-21, which he likened to Paul's "Godly shopping list" as Christians learned how to live and how to grow. What resonated for me was Romans 12:13 "Share with the Lord's people who are in need. Practice hospitality." I've been very touched by the generosity of our church family, devoting this time to streaming our church services, using their Zoom accounts to connect our groups, going out to shop for others, or sewing much-needed fabric masks.

When my friend, Midori, reached out for masks, friends responded. Midori works on the front lines as a nurse, in addition to being out in the community supporting her elderly parents and her family. My sister, Kerry, Betty Loh-Chen, and Lydia Chu have made over 180 masks combined. Midori shared the masks with colleagues at the hospital, and I was able to give some masks to patients and staff at the dialysis center I work at. Staff were so touched by the generosity of receiving handmade items; the colorful fabrics, the craftsmanship and care. I was able to say that "my friends at church made these for you." They could not believe it was a gift.

Lydia said her spiritual gifts may not be in speaking or writing, but instead in her gift of sewing. With her sewing skills, she is able to express her love and caring in the same way. She sees sewing masks as an opportunity to use her time and resources to connect with family, friends, and the church family in meaningful ways.

One of my 83-year-old patients had missed three dialysis treatments in a row because he had trouble wearing the required surgical masks, which all patients are now required to wear. He finally agreed to try on one of the adjustable fabric masks my sister made (Star Wars pattern), and realized he would be okay. He dialyzed that same day with it on and wore it every day thereafter in the clinic. Another patient lives in cramped quarters with about 14 other roommates. He is young and from Saipan and cannot drive due to vision loss. I gave him a pleated mask with Hawaiian guitars print on it that Betty made (he plays guitar). Having the fabric mask made him feel more comfortable getting out of the house to walk and lifted his spirits. The masks are not only functional, but they are like works of art, which is a wonderful gift for the heart.

Betty said she wanted to do more, wanted to be out shopping for the church family and neighbors, or distributing food at the Honda Center, but she accepted the order to stay at home. Making masks was a way she could continue to serve, from home. She and Lydia had beautiful fabric from their quilting ministry with Nell. The small scraps were perfect for masks, and they were willing to work hard to perfect their mask designs after some practice.

In Romans 12:21, Paul warns, "Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good." I value the strength in our church family and their hearts for service. There are many others within our community and outside who are working hard for God's people. During this crisis, we can overcome by doing good. †







# **New Life Zoom Meetings**

At the March 4th New Life meeting, a documentary, Carved in Silence, was shown in the fellowship hall (remember that place?) that explored the racism experienced by the Chinese who attempted to emigrate at the Angel Island Immigration Station in San Francisco Bay. Their harsh treatment was largely due to the Chinese Exclusion Act of 1882 which was enforced through 1943. We were all touched by the ordeal experienced by the Chinese, but also by their determination to settle in America.

Two weeks later, we were all "sheltering at home." New Lifers have been staying connected through Zoom meetings every Wednesday morning at 10:00am. The first couple of meetings were spent helping everyone get acquainted with the Zoom app and sharing how we've been occupying our time at home. Thereafter, Pastor John has prepared a devotional each week which has encouraged discussions and deeper sharing. Also, at the end of April, the New Lifers celebrated Pastor John's birthday by displaying colorful birthday signs and singing 'Happy Birthday' to him.

New Lifers have been diligent about checking in with one another. Those who haven't been joining the Zoom meetings, either due to schedule conflicts or lack of technology, are being called to see if they need anything. Lydia Chu, Betty Loh-Chen, and others have been busy making masks for our church members, members' extended families, and co-workers. It is a blessing for both the giver and receiver of the masks. †
