Missions

The holidays are about giving to others and especially reaching out to those less fortunate than ourselves. In November, our church was able to provide \$25 grocery gift cards to the dialysis patients at Satellite Healthcare, Orange. This is the health center in which our own Cheryl Hasegawa works as a social worker. Many of these dialysis patients are vulnerable and struggle with poverty that has been exacerbated by the Covid pandemic. I asked a couple of the Tuesday bible study members, the talented Celeste Wong and Rebecca Louie, to assist with making some special Thanksgiving blessing cards. Their handmade creations turned out beautifully! On behalf of our church, 22 patients received a handmade card, along with the grocery gift card, as a surprise for Thanksgiving. Thank you to Cheryl and her coworkers for allowing us to come alongside them to bless others!





For the month of December, the missions committee purchased over \$750 worth of toys and gifts for the Friendly Center's Holiday Gift and Toy Drive. Unlike previous years in which we purchased gifts for only 1 or 2 families, the missions committee wanted to more broadly share Christmas blessings with a greater number of families, since so many people are hurting this holiday season. After speaking with the Friendly Center's Director of Development, Arian Ghiacy, we discovered that the Friendly Center had similar thoughts in their approach to Christmas gift-giving. They chose to "pause" their Adopt-A-Family program for 2020 and instead focus their efforts on a Holiday Gift and Toy Drive to benefit 400 families, including 1,000 children. May Quon purchased gifts from the Friendly Center's Amazon wish list and Stacey Wong bought additional gifts at Target. Gifts were sorted by age range and packaged in large trash bags for easy transport. All presents were delivered to the Friendly Center during a socially-distanced, designated appointment time on December 12th. Thank you to all Cornerstone members for your support of the November and December missions offerings. Even though our community is in the midst of the pandemic, our church was still able to serve others for Thanksgiving and Christmas in a way that was safe for all. †

Message from Pastor John Wang

Nov-Dec 2020

I lift my eyes up to the hills—from where does my help come? My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth." —Psalm 121:1-2 NRSV

Dear Beloved Church,

Happy New Year! Though it's a new year, I hope and pray it gets better than what we're seeing in this first week of January. At the time of this writing, a day has passed since the forced entry into the Capitol building by an angry mob resulting in several deaths and many arrested. This event, added to the backdrop of surging positive COVID-19 cases in California, makes me wonder what is happening to our country and in our world? Where does our help come from? My search for an answer to these frustrating questions is to turn to prayer and the Bible. The Psalms is one of the best places to relate to our feelings because they are all expressed so well by the author. When our sense of normalcy is taken away from us in so many ways, the Psalms captures our feelings and reassures us – My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth. We are not in control of these events. Let them drive us to our knees in prayer to God who is sovereign over all things.

Indeed, the Bible is the nourishment for our souls in these times when there is so much chaos and unrest in the country. This new year represents a chance for fresh starts and goal-setting that will bring greater glory to God through our faith in Jesus Christ. I have felt God's nudge to move us closer to a deeper relationship with Him through a renewed focus on Intentional Faith Development as explained in the *Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations* by Robert Schnase. Last March, I planned to do a deep dive into studying and preaching through this book, but the pandemic made me shift my focus. In 2021, it feels right to press on with developing our faith since the pandemic has changed our way of life, offering us more opportunities to be reflective and meditative. God gives us this time to transform us from the inside, working out our spiritual weaknesses and brightening us to shine our light in a dark world. In the coming weeks and months, our church is planning more ways to transform from the inside out through a Zoom Enneagram workshop, studying the book of Romans, and deepening our dependence on God to be uncomfortable for the sake of the Gospel.

Finally, keep praying for loved ones battling COVID-19, cancer, illnesses, quarantine, and isolation. The power of prayer changes everything! We can trust our powerful God of mercy, compassion, and love to carry us when the journey becomes too tiring. The Psalmist knows this all too well:

"The Lord will keep you from all evil; he will keep your life. The Lord will keep your going out and your coming in from this time on and forevermore."

- Breaking Through The new millennium confronts issues of immigration, race, and economic disparity, as the U.S. becomes more diverse and more divided.

Dear Colleague:

We are writing to invite you to cosponsor S.1050, a bipartisan Congressional Gold Medal Bill honoring Chinese-American Veterans who served in World War II.

By 1941, more than 100,000 Chinese Americans had immigrated to the United States. Due to laws such as the Chinese Exclusion Act, which restricted Chinese immigration to the United States, many Chinese Americans faced discrimination and an inability to build thriving communities. Nevertheless, almost 20,000 of these brave men and women, from every state, served in the American armed forces in every World War II theater of battle and branch of service, earning citations for their heroism and honorable service. In the Army and Army Air Corps alone, 1,168 Chinese Americans served from our home states of Illinois, Mississippi, and Hawai'i.

As we look forward to the 75th anniversary of the repeal of the Exclusion Act next year, the United States remains indebted to the bravery, valor and dedication displayed by the Chinese-American Veterans of World War II. This legislation honors a group of World War II Veterans who, like many minorities, overcame discrimination to serve their country bravely and honorably.
