

## Message from our Pastor John Mark Wang

At the time this column was written I have just returned from the Bishop 's Convocation which took place in the desert lands of Indian Wells, CA. I gathered with the clergy of the California-Pacific Conference for our annual time of reconnecting, worshiping and praising God, and learning from wise speakers. Our workshop leader was Rev. Dr. Martyn Atkins, the former



President and General Secretary of the British Methodist Church. He taught us what it means to create "Fresh Expressions" (FX) ministries in the local church, and the sessions helped us to reimagine our ideas for ministry in our churches.

Every new FX ministry at church should be able to answer the question, "How are we being Jesus Christ in the world?" The answer to this question helps us re-focus the purpose of what we are doing and how we are engaging with people. Additionally, are the ministries of our church decreasing the distance between what is church and what is home? If you feel welcome, are having a good experience, and are enjoying the comforts of a graceful ministry, then you 're on the right track. You should have a sense that you belong and are at your 'second home.'

Rev. Atkins provided some great examples which include:

- Messy Church created by Lucy Moore messychurchusa.org (intergenerational Sunday School)
- Sorted sortedcommunity.org.uk (Church led and operated by young adults under thirty years old)
- Kairos Movement kairosmovement.org.uk (different sized gatherings offering different dynamics for people to flourish using their gifts & talents )

## Message from Pastor John Mark Wang (contd.)

What these FX ministries all had in common was that they met people where they 're at. People recognize a need in their community and develop free-style ministries to meet those needs. These ministries were

created by Christians listening to their community for what they desired. In these ways, an FX ministry embodies the faith as good news to people much like Jesus ' disciples when they first went out with the Spirit 's power into the streets. They left their first "church," the Upper Room, and were on a mission to transform lives. The more we commit to going and doing new things rather than critiquing and re-formatting ministry ideas, the more momentum we will have to transform lives just like the disciples.

Thankfully, our church currently has FX ministries active and moving forward through our **EXTRA, BASIC, HUGS, and New Life groups**. May each of our groups continue to partner with one another, the community, and missions ' organizations. We can even create new FX ministries if there is passion for an idea, like our upcoming Golf group ministry led by the talented Dick Chu. Where your passion lies, an FX ministry is just around the corner. I encourage you, dear reader, to go deeper by participating in one of our small group meetings and even consider becoming a leader yourself. Everything is possible with dedication, patience, and trust in the Lord. As long as we resemble Christ as individuals and participate together as a community we are on the right track!

## Missions . . . Stacey Loy Wong

The July missions offering collected \$517, which was used to purchase school supplies for the Native American students at Sherman Indian High School in Riverside. This is the 2<sup>nd</sup> year that we have participated in this ministry project that is sponsored by the Cal-Pac Conference and the Committee on Native American Ministries. This year, through the generous donations received by our church congregation, we were able to purchase 40 backpacks, 24-packs of colored pencils, 48packs of notebook filler paper, 100 spiral notebooks, 10-packs of #2 pencils, 5 boxes of 60 count pens,



and 12 – 2" binders. This is in addition to other donations that were dropped off at our church office. **Rev. Gregory Douglass**, pastor at Native American UMC and who serves as the point person for the annual school supply drive, was extremely grateful for Cornerstone's participation again this year. Besides providing the students with the necessary supplies to get their school year started, these gifts are tangible reminders that there are people in the community that care and support them.



On July 17<sup>th</sup>, Cornerstone UMC welcomed **Tim and Judy Shine** and their daughters to share about their ministry work. Judy Shine is a friend of Alex Yu from Pittsburgh (back in the day). The Shines have a heart for sharing Christ's love, with a special desire to outreach to those from closed countries. They previously served as missionaries in China for 20 years, until that door was closed to them in 2019. God instead presented a new opportunity for them to minister to unchurched international students who come to study in Pittsburgh for college and graduate school. Tim shared a slide presentation about their current service with Pittsburgh Regional International Student Ministry (PRISM).

We were blessed that the Shine family could be our guests during service and for the lunch fellowship. The August mission offering will be used to support the Shines and their work through PRISM.

## World Medical Mission Trip . . . Mary Eng & Samuel Eng

On August 14th, **Mary and her brother Samuel Eng** came to Cornerstone to share some of their experiences from their World Medical Mission Trip!



From June 21 – August 2, 2022, **Samuel and** I (Mary), were doing mission work with World

Medical Mission at the Shalom Family Medical Center and the Shalom Children 's Home in Santiago Texacuangos, El Salvador. Santiago Texacuangos is a semi-urban area but it is still very poor with the average salary being only \$365/ month. Few of the Salvadorians have medical insurance and as a result medical care is expensive and difficult to obtain. The Shalom

Family Medical Center is a clinic that offers routine medical care including prenatal care and yearly physicals on a sliding scale. This means people who are able to pay more will pay \$5 dollars for a consultation and those who are poorer may pay \$1 or nothing. All of the regular staff of the clinic are Salvadorian and Christian. The clinic offers both physical and spiritual care by offering Bibles, tracts, and devotions while the patients are waiting to be seen.



I, Mary, am an x-ray technologist so my primary skills are in taking x-rays. I was able to help take a few x-rays and teach the Salvadorian technologist how to do a few of the more complex x-ray examinations. I did not do as many x-rays as I expected to do but I was able to serve in many other ways. I

helped sort syringes and needles that had been donated. I made cotton balls and swabs, assisted with taking vitals, and filled medication prescriptions. For one week, a radiologist from Wisconsin came and I helped him provide breast ultrasounds for patients who needed breast examinations but the clinic doesn 't normally have this service. I was able to help

translate and write the radiology reports for the doctor who did not speak Spanish. After the radiologist left, I began working with the telemedicine program. I would set up the technology and assist the nurse in connecting with the doctors and presenting the patients. This was needed because the sys-

tem had been set up in English and there were no written instructions for using it. I was able to change the language on the system to Spanish and write Spanish users manuals for the clinic staff so they would be able to make full use of the system without an English speaking volunteer. I expected to be doing mostly x-rays but God showed me how I could serve others in unexpected ways when I am open to helping wherever I am needed.







## Medical Mission Trip (contd.)



Although Samuel had no previous medical experience and spoke very little Spanish, he was also able to help in many different ways. He helped sort syringes and needles and took vital signs. He helped organize the clinic's patient data on excel sheets and found that the clinic saw roughly 5,000 patients from January to June. He was asked to write an English volunteer manual that could be used to train future volunteers. This manual covered everything from taking vital signs to locating patient charts in the file room to inputting patient information in the electronic database. In addition, Samuel was able to shadow the gynecologist and the pediatrician. He was able to

see pregnancy ultrasounds, various gynecological exams, and childhood physical exams. The doctors allowed him to actively participate as well. He learned how to take an EKG, how to hold a baby, and how to use an ultrasound probe.



The Shalom Children's Home is where we lived and where we ate all of our meals. We were able to spend a lot of time with the children. Most of the children are not actually orphans but for various reasons their families could not or were not taking good care of the children. There are also several special needs children who,

sadly, had been abandoned by their families because of their needs. The home provides food, shelter, education, and a stable environment for the

children. They learn to serve others by serving lunch to a nearby poor community each week. They learn music through a Salvadorian couple who volunteers their time and expertise every Saturday. The staff



of the home give freedom to volunteers to teach the children many different things such as dancing and cooking. I, Mary, was able to teach swimming and Samuel enjoyed playing different board games with the children like Chess and Dutch blitz. We also taught the children to make beaded key chains with the 20 pounds of beads that we had brought with us. Living in the same compound as the children allowed us to take part in many of the fun activities that are planned for the children such as field day of outdoor games, a trip to the beach, and a trip to the children's museum.



This summer and our trip to El Salvador was a memorable experience for both of us. The Salvadorian staff of the clinic were so gracious and appreciative of our time with them. The children of the home were loving and generous despite the many hardships they have experienced. Despite the difficulties of living in a new place, eating different food, and surviving different weather, it was all very worth it and we encourage all of you to step out of your comfort zone and see what God can do with whatever skills you have been given.






# **New Lifers Celebrate Wedding Anniversaries**


> be relentless. Satan can throw a wrench into our relationships, our workplaces, or our sense of peace. We are discussing how to be wary and protected and to fight back.
