Message from our Pastor John Mark Wang

"How, then, can they call on the one they have not believed in? And how can they believe in the one of whom they have not heard? And how can they hear without someone preaching to them? And how can anyone preach unless they are sent? As it is written: 'How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!'"



-Romans 10:14-15

Share. Connect. Minister. Disciple.

These are the words that detail the process of discipleship for the church according to authors, Jim Putman & Bobby Harrington with Robert E. Coleman in their book, <u>DiscipleShift: Five Steps That Help Your Church to Make Disciples Who Make Disciples</u>.

These terms are important for us as a family church with deep ties through the generations.

We are a church of loving families who have nurtured and encouraged many disciples of Jesus over the years. We make disciples because we love Jesus and want to glorify Him.

I have often wondered how the church can reach more people for Jesus and deepen our faith. Often my initial thoughts as a Pastor are focused on writing and preaching a great sermon, producing the most exciting worship service, and being the most entertaining worship setting. While these thoughts are not wrong, it is not what Jesus teaches churches to do and is not the model of His life and ministry.

The terms 'Share,' 'Connect,' 'Minister,' and 'Disciple' is the method Jesus embodied to turn crowds into His disciples. Each of us, Christians, calls Jesus our Lord, and so we ought to follow Jesus' method to make disciples in our own lives.

Share

Jesus shared who he was with others through words and deeds. During that time of sharing life together with his disciples, he taught them the truth about himself.

As his disciples today, we *share* our lives with other people, eventually also sharing the gospel—the good news about Jesus and what he has done for us and can do for them (DiscipleShift, 154).

Daily, we share our lives with our family and friends, but rarely are we actively thinking about forming and growing new relationships with people who aren't following Jesus. An important aspect of our faith that is often neglected is the intentional sharing of our lives with those who need Jesus as much as we do. When we take on the challenge of sharing our lives with people we know who are living without Jesus Christ as their Lord, we can become more like Jesus.

Pastor's Message (contd.)

Connect

When people accepted his message, Jesus invited them to connect with him in a relationship.

We connect with those who accept the message of Jesus and help them connect with Christ and other believers in relationship through his church. Next, we help these new disciples take steps to grow, by supplying a place for them to learn how to *minister* in Jesus' name (DiscipleShift, 154-155).

Once we start a new relationship with a family member or friend, we can share the good news of our hope in Jesus Christ. As they grow and become more receptive to faith in God there will be opportunities to invite them into deeper relationship and new friendships at the church. The more connected they are to God the greater their involvement with the mission of God in their lives and through the church.

Minister

As his disciples grew, Jesus trained them to minister to the lost and to others.

Demonstration – Jesus showed his disciples how to minister. He cared for people. He spoke to people to whom nobody else would. He healed people who desperately needed healing. He read scriptures and explained them to people. His disciples could see his compassion. They watched, listened, and then tried to emulate Jesus. When they wanted to learn how to pray, Jesus demonstrated it by praying (DiscipleShift, 161).

Delegation – Jesus gave his disciples something to do. Jesus gave specific assignments to them, and allowed them to give their unique gifts and skills to prepare them for future leadership roles. Likewise, we supply people opportunities and places for people to do ministry. Each person has a kingdom purpose, and people learn best by doing (DiscipleShift, 161).

Supervision – Jesus made his disciples accountable. This is a challenge. After we connect people and get them involved in ministry, we are to hold each other accountable by following up with the people to find out how they're doing. Discipleship with supervision allows people to hone their abilities to overcome their weaknesses so they can become more focused and effective. Jesus shared times of review with his disciples. He asked them questions. He confronted negative attitudes and character traits. He affirmed their strengths and reinforced their identity in God (DiscipleShift, 161-162).

Disciple

After Jesus rose from the dead, Jesus sent his followers to disciple others.

When Christians are ready, we deploy them, releasing them to *disciple* other people in the same way (DiscipleShift, 154).

Mature disciples learn to help transform other disciples. Disciples who are growing in faith and love of God naturally minister to others. But the shift happens when they are intentional in helping people come to Christ, and be all that he or she can be. Christ *personally* made disciples and if we seek to truly be *like Christ*, we also need to personally make disciples ourselves. A mature disciple is a person who makes other disciples who are released to *disciple* others (DiscipleShift, 163).

When Christians are ready, we deploy them, releasing them to *disciple* other people in the same way (DiscipleShift, 154).

Two reminders (DiscipleShift, 162-164):

- 1. Anticipate fruitfulness in Christ. Be hopeful and do not be discouraged.
- 2. The Holy Spirit is with us wherever we are. If we abide in God we will bear much fruit.

I hope to implement these teachings throughout the life of our church with the vision of intentional discipleship making. There will always be opportunities to reach others for God. May we (take) grab hold of these moments and trust God to bear much fruit.

Missions . . . Stacey Loy Wong

For our Mission Outreach in December 2022, our church assembled 60 winter kits for the homeless being served by Project Phainos. Each kit contained an adult-size hat, scarf, gloves, socks, umbrella and hygiene items, many of which were donated by our church family and/or purchased from the December Mission offerings.









We collected \$1,210 for the January and February 2023 mission offerings and it was donated to **UMCOR** to assist the international disaster relief efforts after the devastating earth-quakes in Turkey and Syria. To date, the UN estimates that at least 50,000 people have been killed and many more are still missing. UMCOR has partnered with International Blue Crescent (IBC) to establish a community center in Elbistan, Turkey, where earthquakes have destroyed two-thirds of the city. The community center will focus on the most devastated areas. In North Syria, plans are in place to establish a community center in Nazas. Health centers there would provide health assistance and psychosocial treatment by emergency relief distribution. IBC also has a mobile health center in Al Bab that will move around the region to provide health care for affected people. Updates about UMCOR's work in Turkey and Syria (including the information provided above) can be obtained on Facebook at UMCOR - United Methodist Committee on Relief.

Missions . . . Stacey Loy Wong

Cornerstone church members came out on March 18th to help the shower ministry by distributing blankets, and scarves and also served lunch to the homeless at the Fullerton First UMC parking lot. In addition to other donated blankets, March missions funds were used by the Missions committee to purchase twin size blankets. We gave away over 70 blankets to people in need, just in time for the upcoming cold and wet weather that is forecast in the coming week. The shower ministry is a wonderful ministry that pools the support and resources of various churches in a united effort to share God's Love with the un-housed.

Cornerstone UMC Vision for 2023— Building Disciples


Cornerstone's Vision for 2023 - Building Disciples among us

This is a nice illustration of Five Stages of Discipleship in a circular chart. It helps us to know where we are, and where we'd like to be.





Come join us for Hike & Dine at the Oak Canyon Nature Center! Saturday, April 15, 2023.



Oak Canyon Nature Center is a 58-acre natural park nestled in the Anaheim Hills. A year-round stream meanders through the park. Consisting of three adjoining canyons, four miles of hiking trails traverse one of the few remaining areas of oak woodland and coastal sage scrub in our region. Native wildlife makes the canyon their home and is just waiting to be discovered. Also located on site is the John J. Collier Interpretive Center, a small museum with live animals and regional natural history exhibits.


